


Community Insight Australia tool maps information from a range of sources:

- Australian Bureau of Statistics – Census 2021 and other datasets



Map




1 The **navigate** button allows you to jump to your community. Enter a suburb, postcode or street address. Then you can use the + and – buttons at the bottom to zoom in and out.




2 The **data** button opens up the data menu in themes. Click on a theme to see the datasets available. Click on a dataset to see it heat-mapped.




3 The **info** button on the top right will open up the legend for the heatmap. Each colour represents 20% of the population in Australia.




4 It will allow you to click on **About the indicator** which will give you the definition, source and date of the data you are mapping.




5 Also in the info box you can click on **Data for your areas**, which will give you the data you are mapping in an approximate percentage and number for each region.



6 If you zoom in you can see the most granular level of data in the heatmap, Statistical Area 1 (SA1). An SA1 shows an average of 400 people, or around 250 households. If you close the info box, and move your mouse around the map, you'll see the data for each SA1 appear in brackets in the black box in the top right of your screen. This is a great way to identify areas of greatest need.

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Clicking on the Areas button will show you the grant regions used by Lotterywest and Healthway. If you click on a region you can see which area it covers on the map.

Dashboard

You can compare the needs of the regions across key datasets using the dashboard. If you scroll over the headings, they'll pop out so you can read them.

Area Dashboard

The dashboard shows how your areas compare with each other on key indicators. Data can be displayed as a matrix or charts. "Select areas" to limit the areas that appear on the matrix table and charts. The indicators have been selected by your group administrator - please contact them or email admin@communityinsightaustralia.org if you would like different indicators displayed.


